Report Made On County Seals Sale

Two-fifths of the Christmas seals that must be purchased to pay for this community's voluntary tuberculosis and heart disease control program had been paid for by this weekend, according to announcement.

This was revealed today by Kenneth A. Hartzell, president of the combined Christmas seal fund of the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health association.

"Altho we have not completed our tabulations of funds that have been returned, we know that we have received slightly more than \$200,000, he said. "Our goal is \$300,000."

"This money will be used to help pay for the forthcoming program thru which every adult will receive a free chest X-ray in 1950."

Mobile Radio-Telephone Service Is Inaugurated

An answering service offering radio-telephone service from car to office has started operations in Pomona.

Valley Mobile Telephone Answering Service has been established at 245 S. Gibbs St. by two local men, Jules Wolfson and Richard A. Howard.

The concern offers a regular telephone answering service plus an arrangement whereby customers may have radios installed in their cars so they can talk to anyone who telephones them.

"We feel that the valley has grown to the point where it needs this kind of service. It has been available in Los Angeles for a long time," Wolfson said.

The firm will rent or sell radio units to customers for their cars. All calls are channelled thru the 24-hour answering service. Effective range of radios is 25 to 30 miles at the present time and will be extended in the future, Wolfson said.

The car-to-office service is designed to appeal to professional men, salesmen, service companies and contractors.
