Pomona Police Chief Ellis and Mayor Sandoval presented the awards to Officer Kevin Guillen.

MAYOR/COUNCILMEMBER COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Preciado invited everyone to attend the upcoming Community Needs Meeting.

Vice Mayor Garcia discussed attending a meeting with City Manager Gutierrez and City of Chino Hills to address traffic flow from Chino into Pomona. Vice Mayor Garcia also announced various upcoming Halloween events taking place throughout the City.

Mayor Sandoval discussed his attendance at the Britney Brown, Paris Olympics bronze medalist winner, celebration at The Union. Mayor Sandoval also attended the Kindness Festival and the Pomona Price Center's Annual Gala. Mayor Sandoval requested an update on the park bathroom upgrades and discussed concerns with excessive fireworks going off.

CITY MANAGER COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager Gutierrez advised the City had an Innovation Strategy meeting and announced the Office of Violence Prevention won a state grant.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

At the direction of the City Council Emergency Sub Committee, beginning with the July 18, 2022 Council meeting, emailed comments will no longer be read into the record during Council meetings. However, they will be included as part of the record/meeting minutes.

Sophia Orozco discussed the no fault eviction notice she received, and spoke in support of the tenant anti-harassment urgency notice.

Greg Estel discussed concerns with Planning Commissioner Camacho and with the City's budget for consultants.

Margarita requested additional police patrol in her neighborhood and discussed concerns with the practices of the property managers of the apartments in which she resides.

Jesus Arzate discussed concerns with the issues caused by the addition of a bike lane in his neighborhood.

Dominick Yibale expressed concern for the lack of parking caused by the re-stripping of the street in front of his house.

Mayela Yibale discussed lack of parking issues caused by the addition of a bike lane and a turning lane on the street in front of her house.

Gabriel Yibale discussed expressed concern for the lack of parking caused by the addition of a bike lane on the street in front of his house.

Teresa Gil expressed gratitude for the street re-pavement but expressed concern for the lack of parking caused by the street re-striping.

Jose Gil discussed the problems cause by a lack of parking due to the street improvement.

Alejandra O. expressed support for the tenant anti-harassment urgency ordinance, commemorated Palestinians and expressed support for investing in housing and education.

Genesis Vega discussed concerns with property managers changing the terms of leases before a lease expires.

Carmen Villagomez expressed concerns for the practices of the property managers of the mobile home community in which she lives.

Gloria Boiseñe requested assistance with addressing the increasing costs of utility services at the mobile home park in which she resides.

Xiomara Barrera expressed support for a tenant anti-harassment ordinance, and establishment of a permanent rental stabilization ordinance.

15. City-Funded Maintenance of Phillips Ranch Greenbelt

It is recommended that the City Council take the following actions:

- Approve the conversion of the Phillips Ranch Riparian Greenbelt (Greenbelt) to a City Park and utilize General Funds to maintain the Greenbelt at a Level A frequency beginning July 1, 2025; and
- 2) Approve an amendment to the agreement with Merchant Landscape Services, Inc. to include areas known as Site 24 Silverwood Lane/Village Loop Road Greenbelt, Site 25 Falcon Ridge Drive/Village Loop Road Greenbelt; Section 1, and Site 26 Falcon Ridge Drive/Village Loop Road Greenbelt; Section 2, collectively referred to as the Phillips Ranch Riparian Greenbelt, in an annual amount of \$102,000, effective July 1, 2025; or
- 3) Disapprove the conversion of the Greenbelt to a City park, thus continuing the current level of maintenance funded by the Phillips Ranch Assessment District.

Public Works Director Guerrero gave an overview of the item.

Public Speaker Eric Trypucko spoke in support of approving the greenbelt to a City Park.

Public Speaker Frank Carrillo spoke in support of approving the greenbelt to a City Park.

Public Speaker Danielle Taylor opposed the conversion of the greenbelt to a City Park.

Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency

Public Speaker Alexandria Taylor opposed the conversion of the greenbelt to a City Park.

Public Speaker Yesenia Miranda Meza opposed the conversion of the greenbelt to a City Park.

Councilmember Lustro expressed support for the conversion of the greenbelt to a City Park.

Vice Mayor Garcia expressed support for the area becoming a public space so that it qualifies for other funding sources but expressed hesitation for allocating more monies to a space in which the residents voted against increasing the special assessment, which has historically funded the maintenance of the greenbelt.

Councilmember Torres expressed support for converting the greenbelt into a City Park.

Councilmember Preciado expressed support for converting the greenbelt to a City Park.

Councilmember Nolte asked questions about the current maintenance levels and the hazards that exist. Public Works Director Guerrero answered his questions.

Mayor Sandoval requested a special study session to update residents on the ongoing CIP projects, stressed the importance of fostering community, and expressed support for converting the greenbelt to a City Park.

Vice Mayor Garcia asked for clarifications from Mayor Sandoval.

Councilmember Lustro stated the assessment district fund would still be significantly short for full maintenance with the conversion to a City Park.

MOTION BY MAYOR SANDOVAL, SECOND BY COUNCILMEMBER ONTIVEROS-COLE, CARRIED 6-1 (VICE MAYOR GARCIA OPPOSED), to approve the conversion of the Phillips Ranch Riparian Greenbelt (Greenbelt) to a City Park and utilize General Funds to maintain the Greenbelt at a Level A frequency beginning July 1, 2025; and approve an amendment to the agreement with Merchant Landscape Services, Inc. to include areas known as Site 24 - Silverwood Lane/Village Loop Road Greenbelt; Section 1, and Site 26 - Falcon Ridge Drive/Village Loop Road Greenbelt; Section 2, collectively referred to as the Phillips Ranch Riparian Greenbelt, in an annual amount of \$102,000, effective July 1, 2025.

Dear Mayor, council members, city staff and city residence,

WHY DO I SAY "NO" TO THE BOND MEASURE REQUESTED BY MT SAC?

This fall 27 school districts in LA County seeking \$15 billion while 10 school districts are asking for \$2 billion.

Mt SAC is asking the voters to pass \$750 million, 4th in 23 years.

Put simply, "the more money you can raise, the more money you will get from the state" As I quate Sara Hinkley of UC Berkeley,.

It is rarer, but the State can ship in money without bond as matching funds, this year the State is asking for \$10 Billion for matching funds to schools that their bond pass, unfortunately school districts like LAUSD and Bevely Hills get a lion share of the matching funds.

The last state fund passed in 2016 and failed in 2020, not sure if it will pass this time around since there is a big opposition by a frequent opponent of state and local bonds, the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Assoctian is a major opponent.

How much will a bond cost the tax payers is the question.

If you review your county assessor's statement you can see how much taxes your paying on each bond be it a school or in this case college district.

I would not oppose a bond for it was not the burden of paying more property taxes for a number of bonds.

Schools and community colleges are in need of modernizing and repairing and constructing class rooms but not on top-of-the-line parking structures and Olympic size stadium that are not used by the community that the college serves.

Question you may want to ask, is how much will a bond cost?

According to Mt SAC the new bond will cost 2 cents per \$100 of assessed property valuation for the next 25 years on top of the property taxes we presently paying of the 2018 bond measure.

Who is in charge of overseeing the bond and expenditure,

- 1) State law, Education Code
- 2) Independent, annual performance audit
- 3) Independent oversight citizen committee of at leas 7 members, for bond that pass with 55% yes vote. (Proposition 39 allowed K-12 and community colleges to pass bond with 55% rather than 66.67 priori to 2001, when bonds were not passing in great numbers)

Dear Mayor Sandoval,

I'm writing to you on behalf of UWT, a 501 c3 NGO, about our opposition Mount San Antonio Community College (Mt SAC) \$750 million bond measure (Measure V) appearing on voters ballot this November General Election.

The **United Walnut Taxpayers** and the **Chinese American Association of Walnut**, strongly oppose the proposed 2024 Mt. SAC bond measure. This bond marks the fourth since 2001, bringing the total bond value to over \$2 billion in 23 years—that does not include additional State matching funds that Mt SAC has received. It is unacceptable to ask taxpayers to shoulder such an enormous burden for a single campus site.

This bond would result in over \$4 billion in taxpayer indebtedness over the next 25 years. Homeowners will potentially see their property taxes related to these 4 bonds more than double for the next 20-25 years especially since interest rates are unusually high. This financial strain is unnecessary and unjustified, especially when Mt. SAC is requesting more money for the same projects that were included in the 2018 bond. Why are these projects still incomplete?

Moreover, Mt. SAC has shown a lack of transparency and failed to adequately engage the community. This leaves citizens blind to community impacts and public safety concerns. Taxpayers deserve a voice in how their money is spent, but Mt. SAC's limited outreach efforts undermine trust and accountability.

In contrast, the local school district had a bond for \$152 million covering 15 school sites. This bond was project-specific and came with full accountability and transparency. Based on our research, this bond measure would put Mt SAC at the highest bond issuer in California for a single campus community college with similar number of students.

For these reasons, we urge you to vote NO on the 2024 Mt. SAC bond measure. This bond represents an excessive financial burden, repeated funding requests for the same projects, and a clear lack of transparency. Vote NO on the 2024 Mt. SAC bond to demand better management and accountability.
