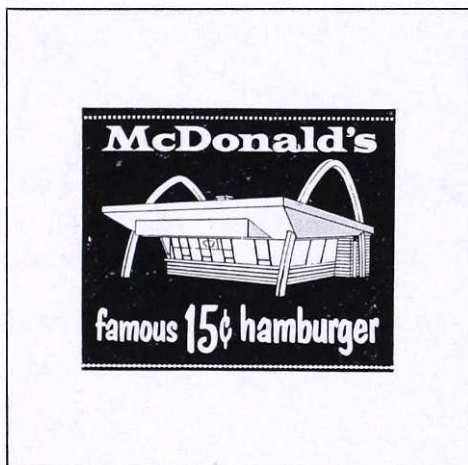

Chino Starts New \$160,000 Civic Center

CHINO — Ground-breaking ceremonies for Chino's new \$160,000 civic center were held in the city park Saturday. The three-unit building, housing the police and fire departments and city hall, will be the first civic center since the incorporation of Chino in 1910, according to G. C. Seitel, city clerk.

Mayor Howard Comstock, Stanley Meston, architect, and J. B. Campbell, contractor, took part in the ceremony.

Five bond elections were held since 1928 to build the center. The fifth election for \$175,000 carried last December. Approximately 25 years will elapse between the first bond election and the completion of the building.

According to the city hall records, elections were held in 1928 for \$45,000; 1936 for \$40,000; 1938 for \$44,000 with the federal government to match this amount with WPA funds; and in April 1952, for \$175,000. All of these proposals were defeated.

On December 9, 1952, the second election for \$175,000 carried.

The city departments have occupied office space rented from the Knights of Pythias at the northeast corner of Seventh and D Streets since 1910.

Construction is now underway in the fenced building zone. The plans call for the buildings to be separated by an arcade. They will occupy the north end of the park and will face 9th street and angle to the northeast and northwest. Off-street parking will also be provided.

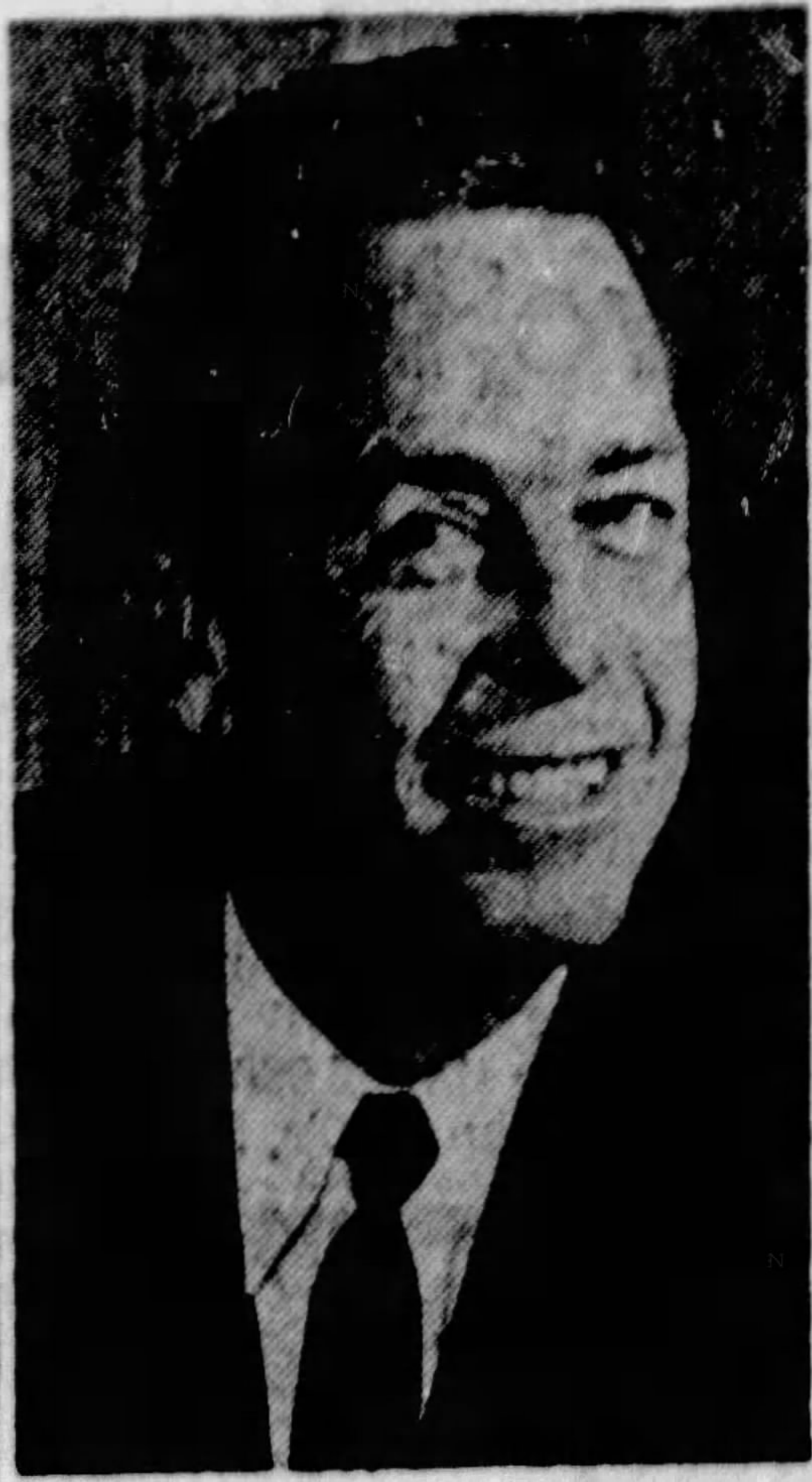
Board To Open Building Bids

Scholarship Scheduled in Architecture

Stanley C. Meston, who represents the Inland District of the American Institute of Architects, will be a judge in the selection of the winner of the first F.S. Wade Scholarship Award.

The \$1,000 scholarship was established by Southern Counties and Southern California Gas companies to go yearly to the student submitting the design judged the best solution to a particular architectural problem, according to Homer R. Mead, eastern division manager of the Southern Counties Gas Co.

New Addition To Civic Center Slated

CHINO — Plans are being made for a county building on the grounds south of the civic center.

The \$60,000 building will house a new branch library, a justice court and offices for a county assessor.

Designed to face Central Ave., the building will have a parking space entrance off Chino Ave. Stanley Meston, who designed the civic center, is the architect.

The city councilmen accepted a quit claim deed Tuesday night from the E. J. Marshall estate to clear the way for the building. Deed restrictions provide that the property is to be used as a city park. The area behind the buildings are maintained as a park with some children's play equipment. Similar deeds were necessary in order to build the present civic center.

Drive-In Robbery Nets Youth \$190

McDonald's Drive-In at 1057 E. 5th Ave. was robbed early Sunday morning for the third time in recent months.

This time the bandit got about \$190 in two paper bags filled by employees of the drive-in eating establishment. The stickup occurred shortly after midnight.

An employe, Keren T. Purther, 19, of 2388 Kathryn Ave., told police a youth 16 to 18 years old walked up to the service window, displayed a pistol and demanded money. She said she took money from the cash register while another employe, Stephen A. Wilson, 18, of 769 E. 4th St., took money from the safe. The cash was placed in separate paper bags and put on the counter where the gunman grabbed them.

The young gunman then fled, apparently to a waiting car.

A third drive-in employe, Richard G. Dickason, 16, of 10141 Del Mar Ave., Montclair, told police he saw the youth at the window but paid no attention since he thought he was a customer.

The bandit was described as 16 to 18 years old, 5-8 to 5-10 tall, weighing 140 pounds. He has dark, curly hair worn in a ducktail and wore a car coat and blue jeans.

The drive-in was first robbed Dec. 29 when a gunman took \$133. The second robbery occurred Jan. 13 when a youth matching the description of Sunday's bandit took \$350 from Miss Purther and Earl D. Hoover, 17.
