Preparatory to the opening of his office, the suite has been attractively remodeled to include a reception room, secretary's alcove, private consultation room, examining and treatment room, in which the laboratory is located, physio-therapy room, and recuperation room. Furnishings of the office are in walnut, and the reception room furniture is in blue leather with chromium.

Longtime Californians Will Mark 54th Anniversary

Residents of California for 50 years, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Proctor of Santa Ana will receive congratulations from their relatives and friends Sunday from 2 to 5 p. m. in an open house at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Clint Bonham, 750 N. Caswell street.

At 76, Mr. Proctor is still actively engaged as a construction engineer and superintendent. In his lifetime, he has helped build between 500 and 600 homes in the Pomona area; packing houses in La Verne and Highgrove, the First Methodist church in La Verne, and the First National bank in San Dimas, as well as numerous other buildings.

Reminiscing today, the Proctors recalled how they were married in Bloomfield, Iowa, on September 16, 1896. They planned to have a Methodist minister officiate, but the Methodists had all gone to a conference, so a friend of Mr. Proctor's father, a district judge, performed the rites. The judge dismissed his court and invited the jury and the entire court to the wedding—aside from the bride's attendant and the best man, they were the only guests.

Move to La Verne
Proctors moved to La Verne in 1901. They were members of the First Methodist church there, which Mr. Proctor designed and built in 1910, donating his labor. Leaving La Verne in 1912, the Proctors moved to Pomona, living here until seven years ago. They now reside at 2042 S. Broadway street, Santa Ana.

The couple have three living children: Troy Proctor, Corona del Mar; Mrs. Wray Pomeroy, Laguna Beach; and Mrs. Bonham.

Mrs. Bonham will be assisted at the reception by her daughter, Mrs. Charles Miller, the honoree's only grandchild.

John Litwinenco

Dr. John I. Litwinenco of 1610 N. Mountain Ave., Claremont, died Friday in an Upland convalescent home.

Dr. Litwinenco was born Feb. 25, 1897 in Herreid, S.D. He came to California in 1930 to begin his medical training at Loma Linda University Medical Center. In 1935 he moved to Pomona to open his practice. Dr. Litwinenco had practiced medicine for 40 years. He was a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, Claremont; and a member and past president of the Pomona Host Lions Club. Besides his widow, Marie, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Elaine Schack of Alta Loma and Mrs. Maxine Corson of Patterson; five sisters, Mrs. Irene Bates of Overton, Neb., Mrs. Kathryn Harvey of Bellevue, Neb., Mrs. Elizabeth Herrman of Denver, Colo., Mrs. Chrystine Corner and Mrs. Maybelle Edwards both of Lincoln, Neb.; and three grandchildren.

Services will be at 11 a.m. Tuesday in Todd Memorial Chapel Pomona. The Rev. Terry D. Cassingham, pastor of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, Claremont, will officiate. Private entombment will be in Bellevue Mausoleum, Ontario.

James V. Hanson, Jr.

James V. Hanson, Jr., partner with his father in the J. V. Hanson and Son Insurance Agency, was born at Big Springs, Texas, on August 26, 1910. He came to California with his parents in 1921, attended schools in Pomona, and subsequently was a student at Pomona Junior College and later at Chaffey Junior College, graduating from the latter. His partnership with his father dates from June, 1932.

A close student of his business, Mr. Hanson took numerous commercial courses in college, and even started writing insurance while still attending junior college. He is regarded by his clients and colleagues alike as one of the best informed in the insurance line here, and his advice and counsel are frequently sought by others.

One of Mr. Hanson's greatest interests in life, apart from the business, is in the First Baptist Church of Pomona which he joined in 1922. He has served the church as a Deacon for a total of fourteen years. His service club is the Optimist. Mr. Hanson has also been active in the Boy Scouts for the past decade, serving as a committeeman and in other capacities in this worthy organization.

On December 25, 1932, Mr. Hanson married the former Miss Edna B. Cannon. They have two children: James V., III, and Gary Paul Hanson.

Mr. Hanson's hobbies include hunting, fishing, and his home workshop.

John I. Litwinenco, M.D.

An unusually able and successful member of the medical profession in Pomona, Dr. John I. Litwinenco in the course of a comparatively short time has built up an exceedingly large practice in Pomona, and is widely known, particularly in the fields of obstetrics, gynecology and surgery.

Dr. Litwinenco was born in Herreid, South Dakota, on February 25, 1897, son of the Reverend J. A. and Maria Litwinenco. His father, who is retired, lives in North Dakota and was an Evangelist of the Seventh Day Adventist Church. A native of Russia, he escaped from that country to avoid religious persecution.

The future Dr. Litwinenco graduated from high school in his native state and subsequently attended: the Colorado Business College, where he taught penmanship while taking his basic training for C. P. A.; Union College in Nebraska and the State School of Mines in South Dakota prior to taking up the study of medicine. From his school and college days on, Dr. Litwinenco has been an active participant in sports. In college he was prominent in football, baseball, boxing, and wrestling in particular, and was a decathlon winner.

In other avocations he was a member of the College Male Quartette during his college years and of the Bards Male Quartette and President of the Bards Male Chorus while taking his medical training.

Prior to taking up the study of medicine, Dr. Litwinenco farmed with his father on a 1600 acre farm in South Dakota.

Dr. Litwinenco completed his medical course in the College of Medical Evangelists in 1934. He interned at the Portland Sanitarium and subsequently served as a Resident at the White Memorial Hospital in Los Angeles. He began practice in Pomona fourteen years ago, and has an enviable reputation as a skilled member of his profession and enjoys a large practice. In addition to other activities mentioned herein, he served as County Assessor in South Dakota for four years and also for a period of four years prior to taking up the study of medicine he was engaged in teaching in the Public Schools of South Dakota.

The former Miss Marie Bailey, originally of South Dakota, became the wife of Dr. Litwinenco in 1917. She holds a degree in music and has taught music for many years. It is interesting to note that Mrs. Litwinenco's great-grandfather was a General in the Revolutionary War and she is descended on her maternal side from Captain Miles Standish.

There are two daughters, Maxine and Elaine. Maxine, now the wife of Dr. Donald F. Corson, has a B.S. degree and achieved fame in tennis and swimming. Invasion Beach Veteran Comes Home on Leave

Returning from the Philippine island of Luzon, via the Uilthi group, he picked up casualties from Iwo Jima, and, afterwards, via Pearl Harbor, Bonham carries the bars of a Japanese army captain taken during one of his engagements with the enemy and wears campaign ribbons of the American theater, the Asiatic-Pacific theater and the Philippine liberation, the latter two of which are embellished with two bronze stars apiece, denoting participation in as many major battles in those areas.

A member of the crew of an attack transport, Bonham left the United States in February, 1944. After two months' training in the waters along the Pacific coast, he sailed for the battle zones.

Bonham, understandably nicknamed "the LCVF (landing craft, vehicle-personnel) "Kid" by intimates, has taken active part in four invasions in the Pacific—those of Guam, Saipan, Leyte and Luzon. He mentions, significantly, that the "beach parties" of which he has been a member during the past year vary greatly from those to which he was accustomed as a civilian.

Despite Japanese counter-attacks at Leyte, aerial attacks at Lingayen gulf, the splattering of shrapnel at Saipan and innumerable other hazards, Bonham has thus far been fortunate in coming thru without a scratch.

Gazing at the calendar with a particularly wistful expression upon eyeing May 17, the date upon which he must return to duty, Bonham has a feeling—and justifiably—that he is rapidly becoming something of

a cosmopolite. It is difficult for him to remember how many ports he has visited during the past 12 months, altho he estimates the number at approximately two dozen.
