Four bids on the construction and installation of a municipal fire alarm system will undergo a month's scrutiny before the City Council makes a decision.

The council Monday night opened three bids, which would have the city hire the system outright and a fourth proposal under which it would enter a lease contract.

All bids were referred to City Engineer Glenn Crawford, who was given until Feb. 11 to report the result of his study and recommendations.

Meanwhile, Alpha National Systems Inc. of Orange announced that a rooftop spotlight alarm device developed during the Sky Knight experiment would be marketed in Pomona.

The new alarm system, called Alpha 5, will be sold through the Valley Alarm Co., 362 E. 4th St.

Alpha 5 consists of a small rotating beacon mounted on the roofs of residences or businesses.

The beacon is tied in with a basic burglar alarm system, and when forced entry occurs, the beacon is activated, illuminating the sky with a 26,000 candle-power beam that rotates once every two seconds.

Under normal conditions, the rotating device can be seen five miles during the day and 10 miles at night.

Alpha National Systems developed the alarm light to give the public instant communications with police helicopters in any emergency, said Michael Goodnight, president of the firm.

Moving at speeds approaching 75 miles-per-hour, the HALO helicopter can be over the trouble spot in seconds.

Board Names New Principal At S.D. High

SAN DIMAS — The Bonita school board has named Dr. Edward J. Weber as the new principal of San Dimas High School.

Weber was formerly a high school principal in Marysville, and served as a school administrator in San Bernardino from 1959 to 1968.

Cucamonga teachers submit bargaining plan

An initial collective bargaining proposal was presented by Central Teachers Organization President Andrew Carlmark to Cucamonga's central school board Tuesday evening.

The board, however, cannot consider the proposal by CTO until the conclusion of a 15-day posting period, which is Thursday.

The posting period is to allow for other groups that wish to be the recognized bargaining agent for the teachers in salary negotiations with the district to submit their proposals to the board.

It is expected that CTO will be recognized as the bargaining agent, as both the board and CTO do not anticipate another group to come forward.

Approved by the board was a resolution to notify Sonitrol, Inc., of San Bernardino of the district's intention of having the Sonitrol burglary alarm system installed in school district buildings one week prior to Sept. 30, which is the expiration date of the current contract with Valley Alarm Co. of Pomona.

As part of the approved resolution, the board will notify Valley Alarm of the district's intent to terminate its agreement at the completion of the current contract obligation.

The Sonitrol system involves the use of undetected microphones in fixed areas, which are monitored by Sonitrol employees. The district plans to have the alarm coverage in both school offices and classrooms at Central Junior High, Central School, and Valle Vista School, as well as the district offices.

The board decided to make no decision regarding an endorsement of Proposition I, which if passed by the voters in June, would allow the state to build new structures, such as schools, and lease them to a school district.
