## CONSTRUCTION OF 88 NEW HOMES WITH \$319,535 TOTAL VALUATION BEGUN IN POMONA DURING YEAR

Eighty-eight new homes were added to Pomona's residential sections during 1931, with a valuation of \$319,535.

The bulk of home building was concentrated in the northeast and northwest sections. 44 of the 88 new residences being constructed in these areas, with the northeast leading 48 to 36 over northwest. Monroe and Madison streets vied with one another as the leading residential streets of 1931 with Monroe street victor, 9 new homes to 8 for Madison street. A number of homes also were constructed on Elwood and Garfield streets.

The opportunity to take advantage of lower prices on materials led many who still had confidence in the property values of the city to build their homes last year. Valuation was lower than in 1930 due more to the fact that construction materials were cheaper than to quality of homes built. More homes also were built in 1931, the comparison being 143 to 88.
