PRODUCTS OF THE CITY'S SCHOOLS

One of Pomona's greatest heritages comes from the contributions made by her citizens during their lifetimes. The city has a unique aura of friendliness and loyalty; it is not like any other town because of those people who lived here. They have worked together, prayed together, played together and stayed together, making it possible for the city to survive the vicissitudes of turmoil and strain brought about by growth and the changes in a modern society. This is well illustrated by observing how many families still live and work in Pomona and the number of citizens who, after growing up in the city, have remained to add their contributions of time, labor and talent to keep Pomona a pleasant place to live. Being faithful to the past and responsible to the present, they help to create a continuing bright future.

In a survey published by the Progress Bulletin on June 29, 1973, it was pointed out that half of the population in the valley is native-born.

To illustrate Pomonans' ties to this town, three special categories have been included in this book. The first category names Pomona families whose members have attended Pomona's high schools for three generations or more. The second category contains names of persons who have gone through the local senior schols and have remained to maintain a business or professional office or to contribute volunteer service within the community. The third category is a list of persons who have attended local high schools and have gone on to establish for themselves a reputation beyond the city's borders.

Regretfully, the three lists are incomplete. The Book Committee's information came from various sources including word of mouth and response to newspaper publicity; unfortunately, no means was available by which everyone eligible could be contacted. Information gathered here attests to faith in the city's schools, and provides a representative sample of the varied and successful careers pursued by the products of those schools.

High schools, other than Pomona High School, are specified. The last year attended when known, is included in parentheses.

Alpha Beta Food Markets incorporated in 1928, three Gerrard brothers, Albert C., Hugh A., and Alexander William, were partners in the operation of four stores in Pomona and Santa Ana. Today, Alpha Beta has more than 250 retail units, including supermarkets, coffee shops and drugstores. Most are located in California, with three markets in Pomona. The book, "The Alpha Beta Story," by Esther R. Cramer, tells about the Gerrard family and the growth of the successful food retailing organization. It is available at the Pomona Public Library.

Booth Bros. Investment Company's roots here go back to about 1900 when Walter Booth came to Pomona and started a clothing business on 2nd known as Booth, Vaughn and Sons. In 1921, Booth entered the real estate business and in 1943, Booth Bros., presently owned by Walter's son, Jack, was established. The firm moved to the present location, 200 W. Holt Avenue, in 1945.

The Clark Bros. auto dealership was founded in 1901 by G. Earl Clark and originally was located at 1st and Main Streets. The company moved ten years ago to 1100 E. Holt and is owned by Don Clark, son of the founder.

Pollock's Flower Shop, 715 N. Garey, was founded in 1905 and at that time called The Franco-American Nursery. In 1922, Lawrence N. Pollock, Sr., a native of Healdsburg, California, came to Pomona and purchased the floral company when he was only 17 years old. The original location, in the 200 block of North Garey, had to be abandoned at the time the underpass was constructed. Lawrence Pollock, Jr., entered the business in 1945.

Todd Memorial Chapel, 570 N. Garey, has stood in the same location since it was founded in 1907 by Walter B. Todd, a native of Brewster, N.Y. who had settled in Pomona two years earlier. The mortuary is a corporation, Todd and Smith Inc., composed of John W. and Richard K. Todd, grandsons of the founder, and Lawrence E. Smith and his son, Donald.

The John P. Evans store, 269 Pomona Mall West (formerly 2nd), has been located here since its founding in 1911 by John P. Evans. His son, John A. Evans, heads the corporation, assisted by his children, Scott, Catherine and Mary.

In 1917, the Auto Club of Southern California established offices here. R.E. Schmidt is the present manager.

Pomona Sheet Metal Works and the Pomona Valley Board of Realtors both came into existence in 1921. The board, one of the pioneer such organizations in the state, has offices at 665 N. Garey. The metal works, at 110 S. Huntington, was founded by Max George. Its original location on North Gordon Street was acquired by the city for a

helicopter site. Paul Pazkovich is the present owner and operates the business with his son, Richard.

The Brogdex Company, 1441 W. 2nd, has been at the same location since its inception in 1922. It is involved in the manufacture of waxes and compounds. The company has warehouses in Lindsey, Santa Paula, Yuma, Arizona; Orlando, Florida, and associates and manufacturing license arrangements with Spain, Italy, Argentina and the Middle East.

Pomona Tile Manufacturing Company was founded in 1923 by a group of local businessmen. Executive offices and showroom were at 216 S. Reservoir St., and factory offices were at 1315 E. 3rd. It manufactured ceramic wall and floor tile and was a division of American Olean Tile Company.

Betsy Ross Ice Cream Company was founded in 1926 with four employees at 225 N. Garey. The company incorporated in 1946 and presently has five locations, in and outside of Pomona, with about 150




Present view of the Clark Bros. building. It is now owned by the V. F. W. CLARK BROS. GARAGE (1923 & 1949) 115 - 135 South Main

Evidence proves that the Clark Bros. auto agency building still exists under this modern facade. Built in 1923 to replace a building used by the Clarks as an auto agency and livery stable since 1901, this structure was remodeled in 1949.Metal panels now cover the second floor windows which stretched across the front of the brick facade. Manufactured marble covers the first floor. Two new entrances were built and a flat canopy placed above the rear entry. The old building is not visible on the exterior. The Clark Bros. firm is reputed to have been the world's first Oldsmobile dealer. Frederick Clark opened a blacksmith shop and buggy and wagon shop in 1894. In 1901 his sons, G. Earl, Lloyd, and Glen took over the business. The firm switched from wagons to cars in 1914 when it became the first Oldsmobile dealer. Often the owners would take a horse and buggy as a trade-in for a new car. In 1964, National Oldsmobile officials and civic leaders gave a testimonial honoring Earl Clark for his 50 years as a dealer. Mr. Clark was credited by the Progress-Bulletin with helping move Pomona out of the horse and buggy era and into motorized transportation. In 1964 the firm moved to 1100 E. Holt Ave. Earl Clark, though retired, continued to be active in civic affairs until his death in 1969.




