Pomona has many indigenous people from Northern and Southern California, Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, Mexico, and more. The use of positive indigenous symbols from a variety of tribes, beginnings, and cultures speaks to the beauty and unique diversity of this specific neighborhood in Pomona. We were honored to have a number of children and community join in by helping with painting and also symbolically placing their hand on the walls, adding their unique handprints to this temporary art piece.

Summary on the symbols:

Bear

The bear is such a highly regarded animal within Native culture, the bear claw often represents protection and a connection to the animal. It is often worn by those who seek leadership

Cactus

True to its nature, the cactus symbol primarily represents protection and endurance. The symbol of the cactus is believed to help with enduring tough situations.

Eagle

The eagle is a powerful symbol that represents victory, conquest, and personal power. The eagle symbol is believed to help with one's drive for victory.

Moon

In Native American beliefs, the moon is a protector. The symbol of the moon means many things depending on the season, the harvest, and when in combination with other symbols, but its overall meaning is that of serenity and protection.

Snake

The snake is a positive symbol that represents healing (due to shedding of the skin), re-birth, and is a physical sign of good luck.

Sun

A widely-seen symbol, the Sun image often means "Earth's Guardian" or something similar. It represents healing, energy, and in some cultures is considered to be the giver of life.

Turtle

The turtle represents Earth and a long and healthy life. Because of the turtle's natural long life, it is no surprise that the image of the animal is widely used by those who value health and longevity.

Water Wave Pattern

This pattern is generally seen on pottery, sterling silver jewelry, and in Native American wood work. It is representative of water cycles, life, and renewal. It is often accompanied with other symbolism.





Native American Indians were a deeply spiritual people and they communicated their history, thoughts, ideas and dreams from generation to generation through <u>Symbols and Signs</u> such as the Sun symbol. Native American symbols are geometric portrayals of celestial bodies, natural phenomena and animal designs. For additional information on this subject refer to <u>Star Chart & Astrology</u>. The Sun symbol was of great importance to all of the Native American Indian tribes. The sun symbol is depicted in a variety of ways, three of the symbols are shown on the image. The sun was revered by the Indians as the provider of light, heat, the facilitator of crops and represented growth. The rays of the sun signified the cardinal directions, North, South, East and West. The Sun Dance was a ceremonial dance performed by North American Plains Indians in honor of the sun at the summer solstice.

The Sun Symbol - Mythology

Abenaki Sun Myth: The Abenaki solar deity 'Kisosen' meaning "Sun-Bringer" was symbolised as an eagle whose wings opened to create the day and whose wings closed to create the night. In Lakota Sioux mythology, a sun deity called Wi is one of the most supreme gods and is associated with the American Bison.

The Sun Symbol - Meaning

There were so many tribes of Native American Indians it is only possible to generalise the most common meaning of the Sun symbol or pattern. Native Indian symbols are still used as Tattoos and were used for a variety of reasons and depicted on numerous objects such as tepees, totem poles, musical instruments and clothes. Indian Tribes also used their own Colors for Symbols and designs depending on the natural resources available to make Native American Paint. Use symbols as ideas and designs for American Indian Tattoos.

Native American Indians had a highly complex culture, especially those who lived on the Great Plains.

Their religion was dominated by rituals and belief in a spiritual connection with nature and these beliefs were reflected in the various symbols they used such as the Sun symbol.

Power Animals

Definition of Power Animals: What are Power Animals? Power Animals are strongly associated with the Native American Indian belief in Animism that is a belief based on the spiritual idea that the universe, and all natural objects within the universe, have souls or spirits. Power Animals are believed to be a supernatural power that embodies, attaches or conveys influence empowering a person with the powerful traits and characteristics of the animal. The doctrine of this belief is that everything is alive, and possesses an inherent virtue, power and wisdom. Power animals represent a person's connection to all life, their qualities of character, and their power. Power Animals are regarded as guides who appear in dreams or Vision Quests in the form of an animal. Power Animals, or spirit guides, walk through different stages of life with a person, teaching and guiding them, and in some instances protecting them.

Power Animals - Tutelary Spirits

Power Animals are sometimes referred to as tutelary spirits (or tutelary spirits) meaning a deity or spirit who is a guardian, patron or protector of a particular culture, place, person, lineage or nation. Over your lifetime you may unknowingly or knowingly have the help of several different Power Animals. Power Animals can come and go unexpectedly, especially after a few years. According to the beliefs of Shamanism all people have power animals, or tutelary spirits, that empower and protect them from harm, like guardian spirits or angels.

Tribal Power Animals

Each Native American tribe has a group of Power Animals that are most prevalent among its people refer to <u>Tribe Totems</u>. The Power Animals of a tribe usually live in the area inhabited by the tribe and have great medicine power. These tribal Power Animals are important in the life of the tribe, as guides to sources of food and other essential items or as guides to the changing seasons.















Power Animals - Spiritual Energy

Power Animals are the spiritual energy of the animal on earth. Power Animals are greater than the actual animals because they embody the spirit and essence of the animal. For instance with a bear power animal, it is the voice of all the bears that have ever lived. It is the Medicine Bear. It is the bear that can see itself and speak. The spirit of Power Animals also lends you the wisdom of its kind. An owl spirit will give you owl wisdom, and lend you some of the attributes of owl. Power Animals will often appear to the Medicine Man, or Shaman, as a vision during a Vision Quest and these Power Animals are adopted as a guardian spirit and teacher. Power Animals form part of the belief in Shamanism but also appear in the dreams of individuals.

Identifying Power Animals - Vision Quests

Power Animals often reveal themselves to us through our subconscious during sleep but are most strongly associated and identified through Vision Quests which are accompanied by a <u>Smudging Ritual</u>. Power animals are identified in dreams and vision quests if a particular animal is seen four times during a <u>Vision Quest</u>. A person can possess up to two of the more powerful animal Guardian Spirits or Power Animals, but many of the less powerful plant Spirit Helpers. Power Animals that appears in Vision quests and dreams all have various meanings.

Power Animals Meanings and Significance

Each of the Power Animals has special meanings, characteristics and significance. <u>Shamans</u> believe visions and dreams come from the Power Animals, and they interpret signs and dreams. The following information provides details of the meanings of the different Power Animals and an interpretation of dreams that feature the Power Animal.















Armadillo Power Animal

Armadillo Power Animals Meaning: Methodical, accurate, slow and steady

Dream Interpretation: Dreaming of an armadillo may signify that you are isolating yourself and making it difficult for others to reach you. It might also mean that you need to be a little be more aggressive and independent.

Badger Power Animal

Badger Power Animals Meaning: Bold, out-going, good communicator





Animal Symbols has different meanings in many Native American tribes. The meaning of the Bear symbol was important
as it represented a protector and symbolized courage, physical strength and leadership. The Coyote symbol is depicted as the Trickster who was so mischievous and involved in his own trickery that he would trick himself. The deer was important

to many Indian tribes as it provided a good means of sustenance providing food and clothing for the tribe and the Deer Track symbol was to signify that hunting in the area was plentiful. The Fox symbol represented a benign animal in some tribes but as a dangerous trickster in other tribes.

Meaning of Animal Symbols - Gila Monster, Raccoon, Snake, Turtle, Wolf & Horse

The meaning of the Gila Monster symbol was to signify preservation and survival and used as a sign of the desert. The meaning of the Horse symbol was to signify mobility, stamina, strength and power. The meaning of the Many Fish symbol was to signify water and the flow of life from the Earth. The Raccoon symbol symbolized curiosity, adaptability and resourcefulness. The Snake symbol has different meanings in many Native American tribes and the ancient people. The meaning of the Turtle symbol signifies good health and long life. The meaning of the Wolf Symbol was to symbolize direction and leadership and embodied both protection and destruction.

Meaning of the Animal Symbols - Zuni Bear Fetish

A fetish is an object which is believed to have magic powers. The Zuni Bear symbol was a fetish that symbolized the most powerful of animals and was believed to be the Guardian of the West with the power to heal and to transform passions into true wisdom. The Zuni Native American Indians strongly believed in six cardinal guardian fetishes - the bear, badger, mountain lion, wolf, mole and the eagle.



Animal symbols, myths and legends: The Avanyu symbol is one of the many snake-like reptile deities that figure in the mythology of some Native American tribes, notably the Pueblo and represented a storm bringer and was connected with lightning, thunderstorms and the quardian of water.





The Panther symbol was seen as a malevolent being or monster who fights then devours his enemies and was strongly associated with warfare. 






The Hand Symbol - Meaning

Native American symbols, like the hand symbol, are geometric portrayals of celestial bodies, natural phenomena and animal designs. Native Indian symbols were used for a variety of reasons and depicted on numerous objects such as tepees and clothing. The hand was a common symbol seen on the face or the body of Indians, which we have illustrated in the pictures on this page - refer to further examples in War Paint and Horse War Paint. The meaning of the Hand symbol represented success in hand to hand combat. For additional information refer to the Eye-in-the-Hand symbol.

Hand Symbol Meaning

The Hand symbolized human life and this sign was believed to channel energy to the wearer. War paint in the form of various symbols, such as the hand symbol, were applied to intimidate their enemies when going into battle or during warfare - this where the term "War Paint" was originally derived. The following picture of the Mandan Chief succeeded - he scares the life out of me! The hand symbol also represents spiritual power, strength, domination and protection. The process of applying war paint provided strong mental preparation for the forthcoming battle. Medicine Men sometimes chose certain markings for warriors, like the hand symbol, and powerful magic was passed on during the application of the war paint, such as the hand symbol, helping the warrior to believe himself to be invincible.

Hand Symbol Meaning

The next picture illustrates the use of the black hand symbol on the white horse. Black was used to symbolize victory and might be applied to the horse before returning home to the camp. Black Paint was made using ground charcoal, mixed with spit or animal fat, so it was readily available. The hand symbol was also easy to fast and apply, requiring no artistic skill, just a print of the hand that had been dipped in a colored dye or pigment. A woman who saw the hand symbol on the horse of a warrior was filled with pride and safe in the knowledge that he had shown strength and domination in battle. She knew that she would be able to look to such a man for protection.

Native American symbols are geometric portrayals of celestial bodies, natural phenomena and animal designs. Native American bird and animal symbols and totems are believed to represent the physical form of a spirit helper and guide. The Native Americans consider the bald eagle and the golden eagle to be sacred. As eagles are the highest flying birds they were seen to be nearer to the Creator.

The Meaning of the Eagle Symbol

The meaning of the Eagle symbol was to signify courage, wisdom and strength and its purpose was as the messenger to the Creator. The eagle was believed to carry prayers to the Great Spirit in the Spirit World and also had a special connection with visions. Eagle feathers were highly significant to the Native American Indians and the bones of eagles were used to make the whistles and flutes used at religious ceremonies and rituals. It was a custom to hold an eagle feather aloft when saying a prayer and during special council meetings eagle feathers were held as an assurance that the person was telling the truth. Eagle feathers also held a connection to the Great spirit. The eagle had the ability to live in the realm of spirit, and yet remain connected and balanced within the realm of Earth. The eagle is therefore often connected with balance. Eagle Myth: The Abenaki solar deity 'Kisosen' meaning "Sun-Bringer" was symbolised as an eagle whose wings opened to create the day and whose wings closed to create the night. 





Native American symbols were geometric portrayals of celestial bodies, natural phenomena and animal designs. Animals were drawn as symbols which were taken as spiritual guides and stood for the qualities and traits of the animal that the symbol represented. The Bear symbol was important as it represented a protector and symbolized authority, physical strength and leadership. The tracks of a predator, such as a bear track, are used to indicate a direction and are also symbols of leadership. The meaning of the Bear Track symbol was to signify a good omen and convey authority. Native American bird and animal symbols and totems are believed to represent the physical form of a spirit helper and guide.



Identifying Bear Tracks

Native Americans acquired outstanding tracking skills which enabled them to find and hunt the animals used for food, clothing, and tools. The Native Americans learnt how to identify bear tracks by the shape and spread of the track. The length of the stride was also an indicator of the identity of an animal's track. Native Americans searched in soft mud or wet sand near water for animal tracks as these held tracks well and often yielded clearly identifiable prints. The claws of the bear were often used to create necklaces and were seen as symbols of bravery and the wearer was held in high esteem.


