SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,130 AND AMENDING THE FY 2019-20 OPERATING BUDGET

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council take the following actions:

1) Adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-01– A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POMONA, CALIFORNIA, ACCEPTING \$5,130 IN BOARD OF STATE AND COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS (BSCC) MENTAL HEALTH TRAINING GRANT FUNDS, AND AMENDING THE FY 2019-20 OPERATING BUDGET BY INCREASING REVENUE ESTIMATES AND APPROPRIATING \$5,130 IN BSCC GRANT FUNDS

2) Authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute any and all agreements on behalf of the City, in substantially the form submitted, subject to review and approval as to form by the City Attorney.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Action on this item will accept the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) Mental Health Training Grant in the amount of \$5,130. This grant has been awarded for mental health related training for corrections staff. The grant period is from May 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020. Staff was notified of the grant award on November 1, 2019.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact is an increase in Mental Health Grant Funds revenue of \$5,130 (239-2090-40875-58711) with a corresponding increase in appropriations of \$5,130 (239-2090-XXXX-58711).

DISCUSSION:

The Police Department has been awarded a one-year Mental Health Training Grant by the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) made available through the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program totaling \$5,130 per the Grant Agreement (Attachment No.2). The grant period begins May 1, 2019 and operates through September 30, 2020.

The JAG Program is a key provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. The JAG Program provides critical funding necessary to support training initiatives and department goals. Otherwise not available, do to annual training requirements and limited resources.

The Mental Health Training Grant is designed to provide critical training to corrections personnel. The training courses include content such as signs and symptoms of mental illness, substance abuse disorder, and crisis intervention and suicide prevention. The grant will be used to send Jail staff to the Riverside County Sheriff's Department Training Facility for crisis intervention courses.

As such, staff is recommending an increase in revenue estimates of \$5,130 and corresponding increase in appropriations for the Mental Health Grant to cover staff training and overtime for FY 2019-20, the following is requested:
